

A LETTER FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT AND BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear Community Members,

We are excited to share with you that all residents in the Dryden Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed budget for the 2021-2022 school year in person on Tuesday, May 18, 2021. Residents can vote from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. in the MS/HS Auditorium located at 118 Freeville Road Dryden, NY 13053. Voters should look for signage directing them to the auditorium.

This past school year has put a great strain on the District's resources, as we have had to comply with many mandates related to COVID-19, in order to return safely to in-person instruction and fulfill our mission to educate and empower each learner to achieve excellence and build a better world. The District needed to do this without significant additional funding. Costs related to filtration, personal protective equipment, additional sanitization supplies, thermometers, temperature scanners, and additional professional development are just a few examples of unfunded expenses at the intersection of public education and the pandemic.

As you may recall, last year the District did not raise the tax levy as we know that many families and businesses were hit hard in the early days of the pandemic. While our state aid has remained unchanged and the District is slated to receive federal aid, we are not able to offer a 0% increase to the tax levy. We will outline why we are not able to do this again this year in the space below.

As you will see, the proposed budget is a rollover budget. This year the Board of Education has adopted a \$43,537,952 budget. This represents a 1.66% increase over the 20-21 budget. No additional programming or positions have been added to this year's budget. The District has also eliminated several positions for next year through attrition. The 1.66% increase is related to contractual and salary increases, as well as increases to unemployment, legally obligated contributions to the NYS Teacher Retirement System and the NYS Employee Retirement System. The District's state aid has remained flat despite our obligated increases. So, despite exercising fiscal responsibility, there is a gap of approximately a million dollars between revenues and expenses.

The District will be closing that gap using unassigned fund balance and federal aid money. The state and the federal government continue to legislate what this money needs to be used for, so the District is not willing to gamble that we can use that money to close gaps between revenue and expenses. The District will be using the Federal funds to cover the costs related to the pandemic and enhance our technology so that we can be better equipped to handle future remote learning periods.

For all of these reasons, the District has calculated a 2.77% tax levy increase for the 21-22 Budget. The tax levy was calculated in alignment with all laws and regulations. This does not mean a business' or household's school taxes will be going up 2.77%. This is the percentage increase that the District can place on the revenues that the District currently collects through taxes. This tax levy increase is in line with the rest of the school districts in Tompkins County. Again, last year the District put forth a budget for community approval with a 0% tax levy increase.

We have always been grateful for the support that we have received from our community. This budget has been developed in good faith. The District has tried to weigh the perspectives of the taxpayer, the staff, and our students. This budget does not eliminate any critical programming the District needs to fulfill our mission and our obligations to our students and staff while "tightening our belts."

RESOLVED: That the Dryden Central School District, as recommended by the Board of Education, adopt a spending plan for the 2021-2022 school year in the amount of \$43,537,952 and to levy the necessary tax therefor?

PROPOSITION 2:

SCHOOL BUS BOND PROPOSITION

Shall the Bus Bond Proposition set forth in the legal notice of this meeting authorizing the purchase of school buses and other transportation vehicles at a maximum cost of \$440,000 and providing that such sum shall be raised by a tax collectible in annual installments with District obligations to be issued in anticipation thereof, be approved?

PROPOSITION 3:

UPGRADES TO CLASSROOM/STAIRWELL/EXTERIOR DOORS AT CASSAVANT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Shall the proposition set forth in the legal notice of this meeting authorizing expending up to \$100,000 for the upgrades to classroom/stairwell/exterior doors at the Cassavant Elementary School, with up to \$20,000 of such cost to be expended from the existing building capital reserve fund and the balance of such cost, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be funded by state aid available, all as more fully described in said notice, be approved?



ABSENTEE BALLOTS WILL BE AVAILABLE

If you are eligible to use an Absentee Ballot because of physical disability, or legitimate absence from the District (business purposes, vacation, or studies) and are a qualified voter of the District, you may obtain an absentee ballot application by contacting Carrie Merriman, District Clerk, Dryden Central School, P.O. Box 88, Dryden, NY 13053, phone number 607-844-5361, ext. 1. Applications will be available between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Please note: Executive Order 202.81 modifies the Education Law to the extent necessary to include the potential for contraction of the virus that causes COVID-19 as an illness for purposes of requesting an absentee ballot application.

Any such application must be received by the District Clerk at least seven days before the date of the aforesaid annual district meeting (May 11, 2021) if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before such annual district meeting (May 17, 2021) if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots shall have been issued shall be available for public inspection in the office of the District Clerk during regular office hours on each of the five days prior to the day of the vote (excluding Saturday and Sunday). Absentee ballots must be received in the office of the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. prevailing time, on Tuesday, May 18, 2021.
