

A LETTER FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Community Members,

We are excited to share with you that all residents in the Dryden Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed budget for the 2023-2024 school year on Tuesday, May 16, 2023. Residents can vote from 7:00 AM to 9:00 PM in the MS/HS Auditorium located at 118 Freeville Rd, Dryden, NY 13053. Voters should look for signage directing them to the location.

We cultivate resilience and build strength of character.

These past few school years have presented many challenges for our District as we have navigated the pandemic. While the worst of the pandemic is behind us, the District finds itself in recovery mode like every other school district in the United States.

As mental health and community resources across our nation are overtaxed, school districts continue to look for ways to fill gaps in services to support students, families, and staff well-being.

If students do not feel safe, are hungry, have unaddressed trauma or unstable housing they cannot learn. If we want our staff and students to be successful, it is imperative that we address these needs.

To that end, the District has chosen to prioritize well-being in our 2023-2027 Strategic Plan. This work is being done in a variety of ways, but most noticeably we will be adding an additional social worker at Dryden Middle School. In addition, we will continue to invest in a behavioral interventionist at the PK-5 level as well as continued professional development and programming to support the well-being of students PK-12.

We believe that positive relationships and partnerships are essential.

As you may recall, three years ago at the onset of the pandemic, the District did not raise the tax levy. As we know, many families and businesses were hit hard in the early days of the pandemic.

While our state aid has increased slightly, it does not match the inflation that we are all experiencing. Over the last 12 months, almost all items have risen in cost.

This affects everyday life from purchasing diesel fuel, health insurance, or even new pens and pencils for learning.

The District is working hard to balance its needs so that we are able to continue to offer our students a robust program to prepare them for life; all the while, being fiscally responsible to our taxpayers and community members.

We act with integrity and accountability.

This year, the Board of Education has adopted a \$46,827,740 spending plan, representing a 3.35% increase over the 2022-2023 budget. This is less of an increase than we saw last year. The 3.35% increase is related to costs such as contractual and salary increases, BOCES services, and legally obligated contributions to NYS Retirement Systems. Inflation related to commodities as mentioned above is contributing to the rise in the budget as well. So, despite exercising fiscal responsibility, there is a gap between revenues and expenses. The District will be closing that gap using unassigned fund balance and reserve money.

For all of these reasons, the District has calculated a 3.10% tax levy increase for the 2023-2024 budget. The tax levy was calculated in alignment with all laws and regulations. This does not mean a business' or household's school taxes will be going up 3.10%. This is the percentage increase that the District can place on the revenues collected through taxes. This tax levy increase is in line with the rest of the school districts in Tompkins County. Again, three years ago the District put forth a budget for community approval with a 0% tax levy increase.

We have always been grateful for the support that we have received from our community. This budget has been developed in good faith. The District has tried to weigh the perspectives of the taxpayer, the staff, and our students. This budget does not eliminate critical programming the District needs to fulfill our mission or our obligations to students and staff. The budget expands support for student and staff well-being, while continuing to "tighten our belts."

We are proud of our community, our District and our #LionPride. Please take care of yourself, each other, and always...

PROPOSITION 1:

2023-2024 SPENDING PLAN

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:

RESOLVED: That the Dryden Central School District, as recommended by the Board of Education, adopt a spending plan for the 2023-2024 school year in the amount of \$46,827,740 and to levy the necessary tax therefor?

PROPOSITION 2:

SCHOOL BUS BOND PROPOSITION

Shall the Bus Bond Proposition set forth in the legal notice of this meeting authorizing the purchase of school buses and other transportation vehicles at a maximum cost of \$495,000 and providing that such sum shall be raised by a tax collectable in annual installments with District obligations to be issued in anticipation thereof, be approved?

PROPOSITION 3:

ALTERATIONS & IMPROVEMENTS AT FREEVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAPITAL PROJECT PROPOSITION

Shall the proposition set forth in the legal notice of this meeting authorizing expending up to \$100,000 for alterations to the building's domestic water system and building security improvements at the Freeville Elementary School, with up to \$20,000 of such cost to be expended from the existing building capital reserve fund and the balance of such cost, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be funded by state aid available, all as more fully described in said notice, be approved?

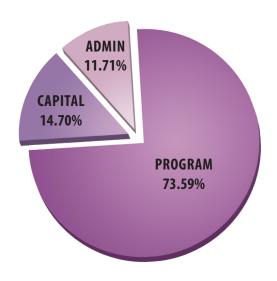

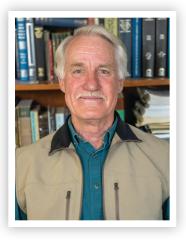

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ABSENTEE BALLOTS WILL BE AVAILABLE

If you are eligible to use an Absentee Ballot because of physical disability, or legitimate absence from the District (business purposes, vacation, or studies) and are a qualified voter of the District, you may obtain an absentee ballot application by contacting Carrie Merriman, District Clerk, Dryden Central School, P.O. Box 88, Dryden, NY 13053, phone number 607-844-5361, ext. 1. Applications will be available between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Any such application must be received by the District Clerk at least seven days before the date of the aforesaid annual district meeting (May 9, 2023) if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before such annual district meeting (May 15, 2023) if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots shall have been issued shall be available for public inspection in the office of the District Clerk during regular office hours on each of the five days prior to the day of the vote (excluding Saturday and Sunday). Absentee ballots must be received in the office of the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. prevailing time, on Tuesday, May 16, 2023.
